Congratulations Dr. Vera (Denise) James!!!

Dr. James received tenure in the Department of Philosophy at the University of Dayton. Dr. James' primary research interest is in American social and political philosophy. She joined the faculty at the University of Dayton in 2008. She received her M.A. and Ph.D. from Emory University in Atlanta, GA, after completing her B.A. from Spelman College. She is the facilitator of UD's Diversity Across the Curriculum program. She teaches courses in contemporary social and political philosophy and is concerned with using the resources of pragmatism to help frame and attempt to resolve urban issues. She is currently working on a monograph about urban divestment and the possibility of justice in U.S. cities in a post-industrial age from a pragmatist perspective. She has published on the intersections of classical American pragmatism and black feminist philosophy. In particular, she is interested in how we might pursue the study and enlargement of the many strands of American philosophies. One of her latest projects is on the radical habits of Angela Davis and John Dewey.

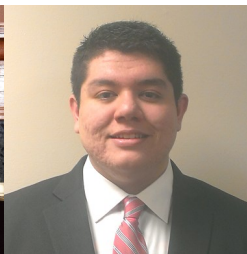

Mona Guerrier Fallen Endowed Scholarship for the Office of Multicultural Affairs

Application Deadline: July 17, 2015

The Office of Multicultural Affairs is pleased to announce that applications are being accepted for the Mona Guerrier Fallen (pictured right) Endowed Scholarship for the Office of Multicultural Affairs. In August 2013, Mr. Destry Fallen '86 established an endowed scholarship in recognition of his wife, Mona Guerrier Fallen, who passed away in 2013 at the age of 47.



Mona Guerrier Fallen's legacy will be felt through this scholarship and all of the scholarship recipients. We deeply appreciate the generosity of Destry Fallen and all of the individuals who have contributed to the scholarship. The application deadline is July 17, 2015 at 11:59pm.

Mona Guerrier Fallen received a Bachelor of Arts in 1991 from the University of Dayton. As a way to supplement her educational costs, Mrs. Guerrier Fallen worked for the Department of English, served as a Resident Assistant and was a grant writer for University Advancement. She received her Juris Doctor from the University of Cincinnati in 1996. Mrs. Guerrier Fallen served as an Assistant United States Attorney for over 13 years. Her husband, Destry Fallen, established the Mona Guerrier Fallen Endowed Scholarship for the Office of Multicultural Affairs to honor Mona Guerrier Fallen's commitments to the University of Dayton and educational opportunities, as well as to remember his wife's positive and enthusiastic approach to life.

One (1) student will be selected to receive an endowed scholarship for approximately one thousand and two hundred dollars (\$1200) for the 2015-2016 academic year.

GUIDELINES

Award consideration, as outlined by the donor, will be given to an undergraduate student who meets the following criteria:

1. Recipient must have financial need.
2. Additional consideration should be given to first-generation college students. However, undergraduate students with financial need will remain the first priority.
3. Awards will be made by the Office of Multicultural Affairs (OMA) at the University, in consultation with the Office of Scholarships and Financial Aid, to a recipient who identifies with one of the primary populations served by the Office of Multicultural Affairs. These populations include Black or African American, Hispanic or Latino/a, Asian American, Native American or Multiracial students.
4. The fund is to be used only for student financial aid, e.g., tuition, room and board, books, and study abroad opportunities.

Undergraduate student applicants must:

- Possess a minimum cumulative grade point average of 2.5.
- Be in good non-academic standing with the University.
- Submit all application materials by Friday, July 17, 2015 at 11:59p.m.
- Have a record of leadership and service on campus.
- Reflect the Marianist value of commitment to community through involvement in diverse campus communities.
