

P.E.E.R.S. Mentoring Program

First Friday of 2018-2019

This year is a record year for the P.E.E.R.S. Mentoring Program! Over 120 pairs of students were connected as mentor/mentees to formalize a student to student support relationship for the academic year. What we know is that these relationships last well past their one year assignment.

Students have been paired based on their major and other factors that a student might have requested consideration being given. Distance from home, academic goals, and personal interests were captured as Student Engagement Assistants (SEAs) and OMA staff met with over 200 students to better understand students hopes for their pairing and specific concerns students may have in participating in the program.

Students have committed to connecting with each other on a regular basis and to attending the P.E.E.R.S. monthly meetings on the first Friday of every month. The First Friday Meetings began on September 7 where mentors and mentees were officially announced. The next meeting is on Friday, October 12 (UD is closed for Fall Break on October 5) 4:30pm.

Thank you to the SEAs for conducting the mentor/mentee meetings and for committing to secure student participation. This year will be a stellar year as students are invested in each other's experiences and committed to exemplifying UD's Marianist charism of community in this real way.
