Hello again!





Abayomi Doll Workshop

For Black History Month the Office of Multicultural Affairs, Campus Ministry and other partners at UD are collaborating to put together a Maafa Commemoration Series. This series of events has already included a trip to the Freedom Center in Cincinnati to learn about the Middle Passage and slavery in the Americas and the Abayomi Doll Workshop. You can learn more about the Maafa here. For those who are descendants of African slaves the Abayomi Dolls are part of a larger way of connecting to those who came before us. Abayomi means 'precious meeting' in Yoruba. During the voyage from Africa, mother's would sometimes take

pieces of cloth from their skirts and make these dolls to remember their children and as a way to help keep hope. The dolls became symbols of resistance. We will be able to use the dolls created during the workshop at an upcoming Commemoration event on February 28 where we will honor and remember those who were lost during the Middle Passage.

An Open Letter Regarding the Ebony Heritage Singers



In 1990, the University did a national search for a full-time, tenure-track faculty member to develop what had been a student/community-run gospel chorus. I wish I could adequately describe how cutting edge it was for a predominantly White institution to see the value in this endeavor. Truthfully, it would have been cutting edge for any institution of higher education; gospel music was not considered a music worthy of study in music degree programs. Yet, UD believed this to be a critical area of support for African American students. At the end of the search, I was selected to fill this role.

Next year will mark the 30th year I've been on the University of Dayton campus and much has happened with the choir. During my first year on campus we moved the ensemble into the Department of Music so students could earn academic credit for their participation. Parenthetically, it continues to be a free credit! The name was changed to the Ebony Heritage Singers (EHS) to reflect the core value of celebrating Black cultural heritage. Over the years we became a strong presence on campus and in the community. Membership grew to an average of 60 students, mostly African American. At the same time, I established the University of Dayton as THE place in the Midwest to come to learn about African American sacred music through annual gospel music workshops. Several colleges in the Midwest explored either moving existing gospel choirs into the music curriculum or starting one. We were used as a model for gospel choirs developed at Kent State University and Berea College in Kentucky. EHS was the first ensemble in the Department of Music to perform at state and national professional music conferences. We have an amazing history and legacy!

In the late-90s I noticed the start of a phenomenon that occurs at most predominantly white institutions, that of gospel choirs slowly transitioning to a largely predominantly white population. I wrote an open letter to African American students through the Diverse Student Populations newsletter (one of the former names for OMA) asking people to consider the importance of the gospel choir in propagating Black culture on the University campus. My comment then was that I would happily teach any student who was a member of EHS. At the same time, I wanted students to take ownership of their culture, to not simply abdicate it by non-participation. Over the years, what I suspected became true. The racial diversity of the group has become a growing concern. We've had fewer and fewer diverse students choosing to participate in EHS. Particularly, in the past two years there have been little to no Black student presence.

I realize students are very busy. That's not likely to change for any of us; there will always be competing opportunities. Many students will say they can't sing; EHS has always been a non-audition ensemble. However, I hope students will consider the importance of the gospel choir for being a supportive, energizing community. I hope students will consider the many ways the ensemble teaches and celebrates African American culture – both to participants in the ensemble and to those who choose to attend concerts. For many years, EHS belonged to the African American community at UD. It still

does; it just does not visually represent the African American community.

Your voice is needed. Your presence in the ensemble is needed. I will close now as I did those years ago: the culture is yours; don't give it away.
