

**UD Bachelor's Plus Master's (BPM)
Enrollment Management and Pricing Policies
(Revised May 13, 2016)**

Enrollment Management

1. Application and Admission
 - a. *Eligibility*: UD undergraduate students who have completed at least 60 hours of undergraduate coursework and have a cumulative GPA of at least 3.0.
 - b. *Admission*
 - i. *Pre-Acceptance*: Students must consult with and obtain approval from the graduate program director of an approved BPM Program (listed below) who submits the Online BPM Approval Form (https://www-secure.udayton.edu/learn/undergraduate/bpm_approval_form.php). This notifies the registrar that the student is a BPM Undergraduate Student and may register for and take graduate courses before and after graduation.
 - ii. *Formal Acceptance*: To matriculate as a BPM Graduate Student, students must have applied and been accepted into an approved BPM Program before award of the bachelor's degree. Streamlined acceptance into the graduate program is permitted, though application steps (e.g., GRE, letters of recommendation) must be in accordance with those specified by the program director.
2. Student Status Definitions (based on time period)
 - a. *BPM Undergraduate Student* - From acceptance date to award of the bachelor's degree.
 - b. *BPM Graduate Student* - The four consecutive semesters immediately following the award of the UD bachelor's degree during which the student must be enrolled in the BPM Graduate Program. May or December graduates may begin BPM Graduate Student status in the subsequent Fall semester. If a student is enrolled in an internship, co-op program or other approved activity the clock stops and restarts when required coursework resumes. Since Accounting 150 MBA students complete some undergraduate requirements late in the MBA program, their status changes from BPM Undergraduate Student to BPM Graduate Student after eight semesters of undergraduate enrollment, the normal period of undergraduate financial aid.
 - c. *Graduate Student* - Any time after the four consecutive semesters described in b., above, during which the student is enrolled.
3. Double-Counting. Up to six credit hours of graduate coursework may be used to satisfy both bachelor's and master's degree program requirements.
4. Additional Graduate Courses. Additional graduate courses beyond those double-counted that satisfy graduate program requirements may be taken as a BPM Undergraduate Student with advisor approval.

Pricing

1. BPM Rate: BPM Graduate Students will be charged the SEHS masters degree rate. For the 2016-2017 academic year, this will be \$620 per credit hour. BPM Undergraduate Students taking graduate courses will be charged as follows:
 - a. *Tuition Remission Eligible* (e.g., child of UD employee). The first six semester credit hours of graduate courses taken as an undergraduate will be covered by undergraduate tuition remission (these are the "double counted" courses). All subsequent graduate courses taken as an undergraduate will be charged to the student at the BPM graduate tuition rate.
 - b. *Non-Tuition-Remission Eligible*. Graduate courses will be billed as undergraduate courses and will, therefore, be part of the undergraduate comprehensive rate. There are no limits on how many graduate courses may be taken before the award of the bachelor's degree.
2. Graduate Assistants: BPM Graduate Students may become Graduate Assistants, upon unit approval. The sponsoring unit will pay full graduate tuition rates if the GA position is base funded. For GA's funded by external contracts, the sponsoring unit will be charged based on the discounted tuition plan above, but only for the four consecutive semesters of BPM Graduate Student status. After that, full graduate tuition will be charged.
3. MBA 150 Students: All Accounting 150 MBA students who enroll(ed) as undergraduates at UD on or before Fall 2012, will be grandfathered in the tuition discount and tuition remission agreement in place before January 1, 2012.
