This collaboration between the Common Good Players, Reentry guest artists, and spoken word poet and teacher Leroy Bean, demonstrates the power of storytelling in diverse communities utilizing our own stories told through the methods of Theatre of the Oppressed and Playback Theatre.

More about Theatre of the Oppressed:

Developed by Brazilian actor and political activist Augusto Boal in the 1950's, Theatre of the Oppressed is a method of theatre-making that enables the participants to imagine and perform a more just world by aligning with all who are oppressed and inspiring critical recognition and accountability through performance.

More about Playback Theatre:

Developed in 1975 by Jonathan Fox and Jo Salas as a theatre form derived from improvisation, storytelling, psychodrama, and Paulo Friere's pedagogy of the oppressed, Playback Theatre performs stories shared by audience members on the spot. Playback Theatre is a powerful exercise in deep listening, empathy, connection, and resonance for audience and performers alike.
