Dr. Anthony Annett
Climate Change and Sustainable Development Advisor
The Earth Institute, Columbia University, and Religions for Peace

Anthony Annett is a Climate Change and Sustainable Development Advisor at the Earth Institute, Columbia University, and Religions for Peace. He works on the intersection of ethics and economics, and is a specialist in Catholic social teaching. He has acted as an informal consultant to the Pontifical Council for Justice and Peace, and co-authored the remarks delivered by Dr. Carolyn Woo at the launch of the encyclical, *Laudato Si'*. He also participated in an online course centered on *Laudato Si'*, produced by the educational platform of the UN Sustainable Development Solutions Network at Columbia University. He writes and blogs frequently for *Commonweal* magazine. Prior to his current appointment, he worked at the International Monetary Fund in Washington DC for sixteen years, including as a speechwriter to two successive Managing Directors, Dominique Strauss-Kahn and Christine Lagarde. He holds a Ph.D in economics from Columbia University, and a B.A. (first class degree and gold medal) and an M.Litt from Trinity College Dublin. He is also a Knight Commander of the Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulchre of Jerusalem.



Dr. Paul Benson
Interim Provost
University of Dayton

Dr. Paul Benson, Professor in the Department of Philosophy and former Dean of the College of Art and Sciences, currently serves as Interim Provost at the University of Dayton. He received his B.A. degree from Olaf College, where he was a National Merit Scholar and a Phi Beta Kappa inductee. He received his Ph.D. from Princeton University, where he held fellowships from the Danforth and the Whiting Foundations. After taking teaching positions at Virginia Tech and the University of Vermont, he joined the UD faculty in 1985.

As a scholar, Dr. Benson specializes in contemporary ethics and social philosophy, and has an international reputation for his research on personal autonomy. Prior to his appointment as Interim Provost in July 2014, Dr. Benson served as Chair of the Department of Philosophy, Associate Dean, and Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences. A native of Chicago, he and his wife live in an historic district in downtown Dayton.

Cutler J. Cleveland is Professor of Earth and Environment at Boston University. He also is a Senior Fellow at the National Council for Science and the Environment in Washington D.C., where he serves on the Executive Board of the Council of Energy Research and Education Leaders (CEREL). Dr. Cleveland is Chief Education Officer at Trunity, Inc., a leading global provider of living virtual digital textbooks and eLearning solutions. Dr. Cleveland is author and editor of acclaimed reference works on energy that include the Encyclopedia of Energy (Elsevier, 2004), winner of an American Library Association award, the Dictionary of Energy (Elsevier, 2005), the Concise Encyclopedia of the History of Energy, the Handbook of Energy (Elsevier, 2013), and Energy and Climate Change: A Primer (Trunity, 2013).

He is the Founding Editor-in-Chief of the Encyclopedia of Earth, named the Best Geoscience Website by the Geoscience Information Society. Dr. Cleveland is the recipient of the Adelman-Frankel Award from the United States Association of Energy Economics for "unique and innovative contributions to the field of energy economics." He is co-author of Environmental Science, the Web's first entirely electronic introductory textbook on the subject. Dr. Cleveland's research on the valuation of ecosystem services, funded by the National Science Foundation, is highlighted in NSF's Top Discoveries series. Dr. Cleveland has been a consultant to numerous private and public organizations, including the Asian Development Bank, the United Nations Commission on Sustainable Development, Charles River Associates, the Energy Information Administration, and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. Dr. Cleveland holds a B.S. in Ecology from Cornell University, a M.S. in Marine Science from Louisiana State University, and a Ph. D. in Geography from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign



Dr. David Cloutier
Associate Professor in Theology
Editor, Journal of Moral Theology
Mount St. Mary's University

Dr. Cloutier joined the Mount faculty in 2006, and holds the Knott Professorship in Catholic theology. He teaches courses in moral theology, Catholic social ethics, and marriage and sexual ethics, as well as directing a year-long seminar for tenure-track faculty across the University on the Catholic Intellectual Tradition. His most recent book publications are *The Vice of Luxury: Economic Excess in a Consumer Age* (Georgetown University Press, 2015) and *Walking God's Earth: The Environment and Catholic Faith* (Liturgical Press, 2014). He is a co-editor of the Moral Traditions series at Georgetown University Press, co-director of the Catholic Conversation

Project, serves on the editorial board of the Journal of Moral Theology, and blogs at catholicmoraltheology.com and at dotCommonweal. He has commented on Catholic news for the Washington Post, NPR, the Baltimore Sun, and other regional and national outlets. Outside the Mount, he serves as a music ministry, follows baseball, and is on the Board of Directors at the Common Market, Frederick's consumer food cooperative.



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Dr. Stephen M. Colecchi

Dr. Stephen M. Colecchi is Director of the Office of International Justice and Peace of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB). The Office provides staff support to the bishops' Committee on International Justice and Peace, which coordinates USCCB policy on international issues. He represents the Conference on international issues and manages a staff of international policy advisors. Dr. Colecchi holds a B.A. from Holy Cross College, an M.A. from Yale University, and D.Min. from St. Mary's University in Baltimore. Bob Deans is the director of strategic engagement at NRDC. 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Dr. Ellen Dorsey

Ellen Dorsey is an impassioned advocate for international human rights and environmental sustainability. Since 2008, she has served as executive director of the Wallace Global Fund. Under her leadership, the Fund adopted a new approach integrating grant making and investment strategies to promote its mission. Ellen came to the Fund from the Heinz Endowments, where she was the senior program officer in the Environment Program. She previously served as Executive Director of the Rachel Carson Institute and Associate Professor at Chatham University and founded the Human Rights and Environment Program of Amnesty International. She has served on the board of numerous non-profit organizations, including the US Human Rights Network, Global Initiative on Economic and Social Rights,

Shared Interest and Amnesty International USA, where she was Chair of the Board of Directors.

Her educational career includes a doctorate in political science from the University of Pittsburgh and a Fulbright Fellowship in South Africa during that country's historic transformation from Apartheid. She has lectured and written extensively in books, journals and new media outlets on the topic of contemporary social movements and effective strategies of non-governmental organizations. Most recently, Dorsey co-authored, along with Paul J. Nelson, *New Rights Advocacy: Changing Strategies of Development and Human Rights NGOs*, published by Georgetown University Press.

Mark Orlowski
Founder and Executive Director
Sustainable Endowments Institute

Mark heads the Institute's research efforts on sustainability initiatives including creation of the College Sustainability Report Card. Mark also serves as the lead developer and coordinator of the Billion Dollar Green Challenge, an initiative that is encouraging colleges and other institutions to invest a combined total of \$1 billion into energy efficiency upgrades. He also managed the design from scratch of the GRITS web platform that helps 200+ colleges, K-12 schools, hospitals as well as county and state governments track project-level energy, financial, and carbon investment performance and share detailed data through a growing library of more than 1,300 projects.

Since the Institute's founding as a special project of Rockefeller Philanthropy Advisors in 2005, Mark has spoken at more than 120 colleges in over 35 states and at dozens of institutional investor conferences. Reports on his work have appeared in the national and business press. Media coverage includes CNN Money, Marketplace Morning Report, The New York Times and a profile in BusinessWeek.

As a past member and chair (2002-12) of the board of managers overseeing investments for New England Quaker Meetings, Mark is familiar with the fiduciary responsibilities of boards of directors and trustees. He also served until recently on the board of Proxy Democracy, a nonprofit organization dedicated to providing accessible information and analysis of top mutual funds' environmental, social and governance proxy voting records. In a previous life, Mark was one of five co-founders of the Responsible Endowments Coalition and in 2004 was REC's first Executive Director.

A graduate of Williams College, Mark served on the college's Advisory Committee on Shareholder Responsibility and chaired its Campus Environmental Advisory Committee. He also received an associate's degree from Berkshire Community College and earned a master's degree at Harvard University, where he studied nonprofit management.



Marianist Father Martin Solma, SM, 63, has served as provincial of the Marianist Province of the United States since July 1, 2010. Fr. Martin's ministry experiences have taken him from Kalamazoo to Kenya. He began his career teaching religious education and English at Msgr. John Hackett High School in Kalamazoo, Mich. (1971-1975) and Purcell Marian High School in Cincinnati (1979-1982). In 1982, Fr. Martin began more than 25 years of ministry in Eastern Africa. He first served as assistant novice director at the Marianist novitiate in Ekpoma, Nigeria, and became director of the Marianist novitiate in Nairobi, Kenya, in 1985.

Fr. Martin was appointed regional superior for Eastern Africa in 1992, a position he held until 1998. He served five years (1999-2004) as director of the Marianist scholasticate in Nairobi before being appointed to a three-year term as district superior of Eastern Africa in 2004. Fr. Martin served as manager of Our Lady of Nazareth Primary School in Nairobi where he was actively involved in the school's development for more than 13 years. OLN is a school for 1,900 children from the Mukuru kwa Njenga slums in Nairobi.

Fr. Martin was born in Cleveland, where he met the Marianists while attending St. Joseph High School. Upon graduation in 1966, Fr. Martin entered the Marianist novitiate at Marcy, N.Y. He professed first vows in 1967 at Marcy and perpetual vows in 1973 at Mount Saint John in Dayton. Fr. Martin was ordained in 1978 in Dayton. He received a bachelor's degree in philosophy and English in 1971 from the University of Dayton and a master's degree in religious education in 1975 from Boston College. In 1979, Fr. Martin received a master of divinity degree from the University of St. Michael's College in Toronto.
