THE BASICS

- 90 Credits required for graduation
- Summer credits available – no more than 10 credits in each summer session
- You are not permitted to take over 16 credits total for the summer

KEY DATES

- **March 21** – Summer online registration open
- **May 9 – June 27** – Summer I term
- **May 31-August 9**- Summer II term
- **Wednesday, March 23, 8:00 am** – Fall online registration begins for students graduating in 2017

REQUIREMENTS

- Evidence (offered Fall, Spring & Summer)
- Upper Level Writing Requirement (Appellate Practice & Procedure **OR** Transactional Drafting) - **Must be fulfilled before taking the Capstone in your final year**
- ADR (Choose from ADR for the Litigator **OR** Conflict Management or Interviewing, Counseling & Negotiation [all offered Fall and/or Spring] (probably already completed). **Please note:** You can take either ADR for the Litigator **OR** Conflict Management, but not both. You may take a second ADR course as an elective.
- Required coursework for rising 3L's: Professional Responsibility; Externship/Clinic; and Capstone
- **Additional Requirements for Summer 2015 Starters Only:** Real Property II, Criminal Procedure- Investigative
- Strongly recommend that you take Bar Passage/Bar Tutor in your final semester

FILLING OUT THE SCHEDULE: ELECTIVES

- Courses covering subject areas tested on the bar
- Prerequisites (*e.g.*, Intellectual Property, Evidence, Business Organization, Income Tax) for courses you may want to take later- especially check Capstone course descriptions
- Courses that interest you. Where do you see yourself going?

PLANING AHEAD

Think about how you want to allocate your remaining credits needed for graduation among the remaining semesters.

Please note: *Students must maintain at least a cumulative GPA of 2.20, or face academic dismissal. Also, students graduating in December and planning to take the February bar have almost one month less to study for the bar than students graduating in May and taking the July bar.*
