PERSONAL SAFETY TIPS:

BE AWARE of your surroundings.

WALK WITH A FRIEND or use Mom's limo 937-229-2124.

BE ALERT so you can be responsive.

SECURE YOUR HOME.

Close your windows and lock your doors at all times to ensure personal safety.

REPORT if you see any person committing a crime or acting suspiciously by calling the UD Police Department immediately at 911 (from a campus phone) or 937-229-2121.

VICTIM OF A CRIME?

TRY TO AVOID PANICKING.


Stay calm and avoid displaying signs of fear or anger.

AVOID POWER STRUGGLES over personal valuables. The risk of potential physical harm is not worth taking.

BE DESCRIPTIVE when reporting an incident and the suspects, which includes describing their approximate age, complexion, race/ethnicity, build, height, and weight. Provide as much detail as possible including the type and color of clothing, hair color and length, and any facial hair.

IMMEDIATELY CALL THE POLICE when you can safely report the crime. Identify yourself, your location, and if any medical attention is needed.

CAMPUS SAFETY ADVISORY

EXPECT AN ADVISORY WHEN A:

WEAPON is threatened or displayed.

THREAT to you or the community is evident.

SUSPECT is at large and has not been apprehended.

Under the Clery Act, the University is required to provide emergency notifications and timely warnings regarding crimes that occur on or near campus that pose a threat to the UD community.

CLERY ACT REQUIREMENTS:

ANNUAL SECURITY REPORT Institutions must publish and distribute an annual security report to students and employees that includes safety and security policy statements and crime statistics.

CRIME LOG

A daily crime log includes crime reports and statistics.

CAMPUS ALERTS

Institutions must provide timely warnings if there is a threat to campus safety.



CRIME STATISTICS

Each year crime statistics are reported to the US Department of Education; records must be kept for at least three years.
